




### Comparing Prints

- Have your child trace his foot and hand and cut them out. Or, you can place ink on his foot and hand to make a foot and hand print like they do to newborns feet in the hospital.
- Compare their foot and hand to an object at home. Maybe a dessert plate.
- Record how many inches and the comparison object on the back. Record which is larger, their hand or foot.
- Store in the pocket with the polar bear print.

**Printing:** Print the first page, and then put it back in the printer and print the back side. Or, you can cut them out and glue or tape back to back.

This is the back side to the **'Hind Foot'** card. Write in a little about the polar bears hind foot.

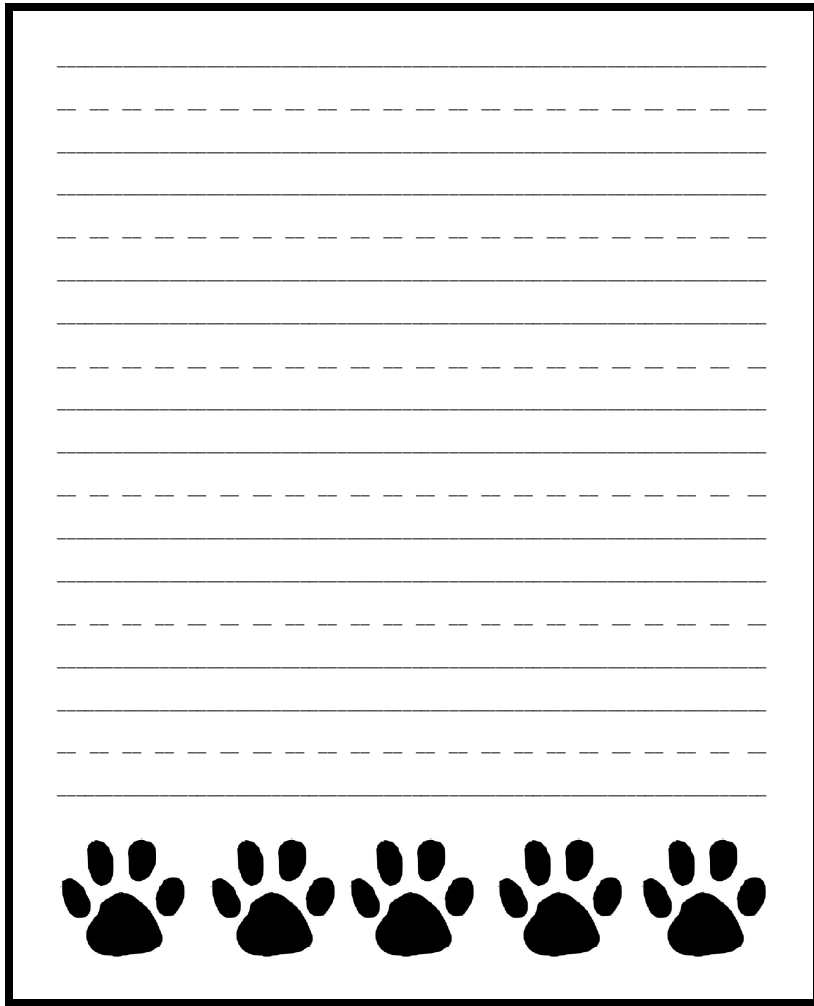
- They walk on the soles of their feet with their heels hitting the ground first.
- They have fur on the soles of their feet to help with walking on the ice and to keep them warm.

- The hind feet are elongated

This is also the back side of the **'front paw'** card. Write a little about their forepaws.

- The front paw, or forepaws, of the polar bear are very large
- They too are covered with fur for warmth and easier walking on ice.
- They are round in shape.
- They are often compared to the size of a dinner plate, being about 12" in diameter.
- Partially webbed to aid in swimming.

This can be used as the backs of the cards also for younger kids.

- They walk on the soles of their feet with their heels hitting the ground first.
